


## 2016 Annual Breakfast Meeting

# **Adams Avenue Business Association/Business Improvement District**

The AABA was organized in the early '80s and incorporated in 1985 as a nonprofit for the purpose of revitalizing and marketing the Adams Avenue business corridor. The AABA oversees a diverse work plan which includes: special events, marketing, avenue maintenance, monthly committee meetings, managing community assets, and advocacy. Partnering with local business operators, property owners, and government agencies, the AABA seeks to improve the economic and physical conditions of the business district. The Association is overseen by a 15-member Board of Directors selected annually from member business owners located within the Adams Avenue Business Improvement District boundaries.

The Business Improvement District or BID was initiated by the City of San Diego after a majority of businesses voted to establish the district in the 1980s. The City charges an annual BID fee to each registered business license holder within the Adams Avenue BID to help fund area promotions. These same business operators are automatically members of the AABA. The AABA is under contract with the City to administer the BID program and the approximately \$50,000 in yearly BID assessments contributed by the Association's 600 members. The AABA leverages these BID fees into a \$500,000 annual budget.

### **Maintenance Assessment District**

Adams Avenue property owners are assessed an annual fee to fund physical improvements and maintenance. These Maintenance Assessment District or MAD fees provides approximately \$40,000 worth of annual funding. The MAD boundaries roughly correspond to the areas BID boundaries and extend from Hamilton St. on the west side to Vista Drive in Kensington. The AABA is under contract with the City of San Diego to administer the MAD and is reimbursed by the City for MAD eligible expenses. The MAD funds activities which include day porter services, trash collection, graffiti control, and tree maintenance. The AABA uses a mix of contractors and employees to provide MAD services.

The Adams Avenue Street Fair is the AABA's longest running promotion and the centerpiece of the Association's special event programming. Featuring 100 bands performing on 8 stages, 300 vendors spread out along 8 blocks, and a full scale carnival, the Street Fair draws over 100,000 weekend visitors to the community. The 34th annual edition, held September 26th & 27th, 2015 generated record amounts of publicity for the district, increased

sales volumes for many area merchants and surpluses for the AABA. Street Fair revenue from vendor booth sales, beer concessions, program ads, t-shirt sales, sponsorships and grants exceeds \$250,000, from which the AABA netted \$91,393 in 2015. The Street Fair was originally organized to celebrate the relighting and refurbishment of the Normal Heights neon sign and the initiation of commercial revitalization efforts. The event has grown from a neighborhood block party to a regionally recognized celebration.


# Adams Avenue Unplugged

In 2015 Unplugged presented more than 170 musical performances inside 22 restaurants and bars and on three community stages. The innovative festival format provides intimate performance settings while dispersing musical entertainment throughout the business district, creating a 2-mile long musical walkabout. The event has generated critical acclaim and packs the business district with festival attendees. 2015 festival headliners featured Anais Mitchell, Hot Buttered Rum, David J, Tim Flannery & The Lunatic Fringe, and Roose-velt Dime, along with local mainstays Yale Strom, Gregory Page, Sara Petite, Robin Henkel, and Cindy Lee Berryhill.



## **Taste of Adams Avenue**

Last year's Taste of Adams Avenue was another hugely successful promotion with over 30 participating restaurants. Foodies were delighted in the range of offerings and flavors which resulted in many positive reviews of eateries on the Avenue. A free trolley was available attendees to ride the 2-mile route. Taste of Adams Avenue takes place the last Sunday in June.



# Holiday on Adams Ave

Holiday on Adams Avenue took place on December 13th this year with activities in Kensington Park. This kid-centric event featured snow play, sponsored by Villainous Lair Comics and Gaming, and pictures with Santa. New to the holiday promotion this year was a special performance by Fern Street Circus, sponsored by Councilwoman Marti Emerald's office. The event experienced capacity crowds. Additional snow is planned for next year's event, as this celebration is becoming increasingly popular with neighborhood families.

# New Event: Adams Avenue Spirit Stroll

The AABA launched a new special event in 2015 which featured retail locations hosting holiday themed cocktails curated by Adams Avenue bars and restaurants. The event was a huge success, completely selling out, with over 500 attendees sipping and shopping. The event took place on Small Business Saturday, a nationally coordinated effort to direct holiday shoppers to small businesses.







#### **Other Activities**

**Holiday Decorations**– The AABA continued to expand its holiday decorations in 2015 with the addition of red garland wrapped lamp posts to compliment the holiday banners purchased the year prior.

**Utility Box Art**– Also completed in 2015 was a fresh coat of paint on 24 utility boxes, all painted by local artists. The project was commissioned by the AABA and coordinated by former Adams Avenue- current North Park- business owner, Jason Gould of Visual Shop SD.

**Lamp Post Painting**– Bids have been solicited for the repainting of the antique acorn style street lamps. The AA-BA is planning to commission this work in 2016.

**Bike Corral & Racks**– The organization facilitated the installation of new bikes racks and a bike corral on the Avenue.

**Community Planning**– Board members and staff took part in community forums this year, to discuss: the expansion of Adams Elementary School, North Park Community Plan Update, new bike lanes, parking solutions, and pedestrian safety.

**New Mural Subsidy Policy**- The AABA will subsidize up to four murals per year, at a cost of 30% not to exceed \$500 per mural in order to encourage business and property owners to partner on underwriting the remaining cost of the murals.

**Discount Fabrics Marquee Management**– For the last 20 years the AABA has managed the messaging of the Discount Fabrics marquee to keep the community informed and updated on Adams Avenue happenings.

**Quarterly Mixers**– Quarterly mixers were held alternating between morning and early evening gatherings at Polite Provisions, Dimille's Italian Restaurant, Get Fit on Adams, and Home Start Thrift Boutique.

# Other Projects continued...

**Board & Committee Meetings**– The AABA holds monthly Board of Director meetings as well as four committee meetings. The meetings are open to the general public. See back page or website for details.

**Power washing**– Select blocks received power washing and gum removal treatments.

**Tree trimming**– The Association paid to have the Avenue's palm trees, and Kensington's pear trees trimmed and shaped this year. Underwritten by the MAD contract and property owner assessments, the AABA maintains hundreds of street trees that were first planted during the revitalization campaigns of the 80's and 90's.

**Tree replacements**– Replacement of 12 dead or non-thriving trees were completed in 2015.

**PROW**– Adams Avenue merchants are allowed limited use of their sidewalks through the Pedestrian Right of Way (PROW) permit program administered by the AABA and other BIDs in the City of San Diego. Contact the Adams Avenue Business office for more info.

**Normal Heights Community Center**- The AABA manages the Normal Heights Community Center's hall reservations, which are available to the general public and utilized by approximately 1,000 people a month.

**Support to Community Events**– Adams Ave and the surrounding community has become a sought after venue for special events and other activities. The AABA has been proud to

support many of those this year including: Rock 'n' Roll Marathon, Art Around Adams, Movies in the Park, Alex's Lemonade Stand, Kimi's Day on Adams, and Mid-City Little League.
